This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance, outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not



necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

Play Project (£1,500)	Funding provided additional resources to facilitate the Play Project to give greater opportunities to all pupils.	• The Play project allows pupils to lead the play – it allows creative thought and imaginative play and this develops other skills For examples negotiating, sharing, and working things out collaboratively as well as developing important language and communication skills such as giving and listening to instructions from adults and peers.

- Money was put aside for this, but we were unable to find a pool that had capacity to take us post Covid. We will try again this year.
- Used funding to purchase consumables to support new opportunities ie netball hoops for the hall
- The offsite opportunities have been varied throughout the year and have allowed pupils to try things that they might otherwise have not done, due to distance from home / cost / family circumstances
- We have trained teachers and support staff in CoJo and Play Project work. This means that all staff can deliver the work and have a solid understanding of its place in the social curriculum and how it can benefit our pupils.

- Without this spend we would be unable to extend the experiences of the pupils.
- Supporting the new experiences is invaluable and allows all pupils to take a risk and step out of their comfort zone.
